Following are the minutes of IQAC meeting held on 27.07.2023at 02.00pm at assembly hall of SCOA. Institute will be applying for 2^{nd} cycle of accreditation process, compilation of 2018-19 to 2022-23 as per revised SSR. And Planning for upcoming Academic year.

Criterion I: Curricular aspects

1.1.1 QIM: The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a wellplanned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment.

- Five-tiered curriculum delivery system adapted comprising of Principal, HOD, Division, heads, Year and Subject Coordinators.
- Teaching methodology focuses on: theoretical, practical or demonstration of projects and research.
- Similar Session and Lesson Plan are prepared in each term and reviewed in monthly meetings.
- The documentation is carried out simultaneously for syllabus completion, academic performances, and attendance records at the end of each semester.
- Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) in the institute adheres to the academic calendar prepared by SPPU.
- To prevent overlaps, teaching schedule for each class for each semester is prepared.
- Progressive evaluation dates, jury for all subjects, examinations, co and extracurricular activities, and holidays are mentioned.
- For systematic progressive assessment, the monthly review meetings are conducted to monitor status of completion of teaching content as per syllabus, quality of students' academic work, attendance status, etc.
- Monthly meeting reports (digital format) are sent to parents and discussed at Teachers-Parents (PTM) meetings.Feedback is considered to improve the system. Remedial classes are conducted for the nonperforming students.
- College conducts mock test and mock viva/ juries during the semester.College conducts practice exams, question bank is shared with students, to improve quality of performances.

1.3.1. QIM: Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability in transacting the Curriculum

PROFESSIONAL ETHICS: Professional Practice and Project management subjects acquaint student about duties, liabilities and ethics so as to produce sensible and responsible professional. Communication skills prepare students with professional expertise and interpersonal relation. Practical Training enables student to follow professional ethics while working in an office for 120 days.

HUMAN VALUES: History of Architecture subject in initial years builds knowledge base and awareness of human values, traditional system, and socio-cultural context from ancient civilizations to modern era. In Urban studies, fourth year students learn about inclusive approach of settlement planning and people-centric strategy from city to site in design of public places.

ENVIRONMENT AND SUSTAINABILITY: Climatology, Environmental Science subjects enable students to understand climatic factors and environmental issues for climate responsive sustainable design strategy.

Environment and energy management Elective deals with sustainable development goals, energy conservation building codes and environmental law and legislation.

In architectural design, knowledge from all disciplines is combined to make the greatest choices for people and the environment. Recognizing human worth in the context of design briefs and expressing it in design solutions. Studies are supposed to consider human demands based on gender, career, background, physical needs, etc., and propose logical solutions based on the learning.

M.Arch. (Architectural Conservation) course caters to sustainable approach by focusing on the adaptive reuse of old structures, values, importance, and responsibility towards cultural heritage in Conservation studios of three semesters.

- Conservation legislation and Conservation Practice and Training are the subjects through which students get acquainted with duties, liabilities and ethics of conservation practices and practical experience while working in an office for two months in third semester.
- In History theory and criticism, students study theories, philosophies that have significant contributions in the development of conservation practice through human values and traditional knowledge.
 M.Arch. (Computer Applications) curriculum is designed to train students while working in an office for two months in third semester for understanding and practicing professional ethics in subject of Digital Practice and Professional Training.
- Urban design projects incorporate study of gender specific issues along with futuristic development.

2.3.1 QIM: Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problemsolving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences using ICT tools.

- Adopting student centric teaching learning methods to transform students from being passive recipient to active and involved learner by ensuring their involvement using ICT tools in class activities, thus boosting their confidence, and encouraging independence.
- The pedagogy for architectural design subject encompasses Experiential learning methods, such as case studies to understand the design and planning of a particular project, site visits to understand natural, social and cultural context, design demonstrations in 2D drawings and in 3D views and physical models, regular reviews by jurors and viva in SPPU examination.
- For design demonstration, students use various digital tools like PowerPoint presentations, Videos and Films, AutoCad for making architectural drawings, sketch-up for making 3D views, walkthrough, Laser Cutting machine and 3D Printers for physical model.
- These digital tools help them to develop skills of using modern and advanced software which are mandatory requirement for employment and for professional practices and higher studies, and build their confidence to present and explain in front of a jury panel.
- The ICT enabled studios and classrooms in the institute make possible to use all digital tools.
- ICT tools are used widely by faculty and students to present in audio-visual medium, videos and films of buildings, construction, historic buildings, and places.
- Regular reviews and seminars are conducted in AV mode for internal assessment, which help students to
 develop communication skills while presenting their works in front of entire class.
- During pandemic period, ICT platforms and tools were widely used, for creating e-content of learning, google meet and Microsoft Teams for teaching learning and google sheet for keeping records and making reports. Whatsapp and emails are used for circulating notices and information quickly and efficiently.

2.5.1 QIM: Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

- Broadly, there are two assessments; Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) and Comprehensive External Examination (CEE), which is controlled by SPPU. The role of the institute in CEE is to conduct examinations as per SPPU guidelines and circulars, timetables are communicated to the students.
- CEE for architectural course is conducted in two methods at the end of each semester for all classes; sessional / viva examinations for most of the subjects, assessed by both internal and external examiners and written examination for theory subjects.
- Theory examinations are further divided into two parts; insem, conducted at college and endsem, conducted by SPPU.
- Students are given feedback simultaneously while evaluating in front of them in the class and progressive marking is reviewed in monthly/quarterly IAMC meetings. Reports of status of academic performances are sent to parents and students immediately.
- Internal mock tests for theory subjects, jury and mid-term marking for sessional subjects are conducted and students are informed about their status of performances.
- The institute follows an efficient method of resolving grievances raised by students regarding CIA of their academic works.
- Grievances of students regarding CEE related to end semester marks in theory subjects, students can apply for re-evaluation to SPPU through online from their login ids and they can obtain photocopies of their answer sheets from the University.

2.6.1 QIM: Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on website and attainment of POs and COs are evaluated

- POs incorporate many areas of inter-related knowledge, skills and personality traits that are to be acquired by the students during their graduation.
- The institute formulated POs based on guidelines of NBA, considering relevant and attainable for architectural studies such as architectural knowledge, professional competence, technological knowhow, commitment to the society, sustainable approach, architectural ethics, and communication skills.
- Both POs and PSOs are discussed in IAMC and IQAC meetings and approved after critically review.
- The institute offers only one branch of architectural studies at UG and PG levels, PSOs address objectives of the respective specializations.
- Course outcomes (COs) are direct statements that describe the essential and enduring disciplinary knowledge, abilities that students should possess and the depth of learning that is expected upon completion of a course.
- COs are prepared for each subject in consultation with a team of teachers and expert senior faculty members teaching the same subject considering requirement of the syllabus.
- There are 4 to 6 COs formulated as per unit module/topics with varied weightages, hours of teaching learning needed, appropriate teaching methods, articulation of assignments and expected outcome for each subject.
- Before introduction of the system, faculty members were trained to prepare OBE pattern teaching learning and method of assessment of attainments. The students were informed about POs, PSOs and COs through college website and display boards in the college.

2.6.2QIM: Attainment of POs and COs are evaluated.

- Outcome-Based Education (OBE) is a student-centric teaching and learning methodology, focuses on skills and competencies that students must demonstrate when they exit.
- Attainments of POs is measured simultaneously through CO-PO, PSO matrix at end of each course and program to assess how well expected levels of POs are achieved which is the main aim of teaching learning of the program.

CO Attainment

• Each course has a defined set of COs with corresponding assignments and evaluation criteria and the level of achievements is evaluated through attainment of COs.

- The institute carries out direct measurement of attainment of COs of a specific Course is determined from the performances of students considering average of sum of two outcomes; Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) and in Comprehensive External Examination (CEE).
- Direct methods indicate attainment of knowledge and skills from performances of students in sessional subjects of architecture in progressive assignment markings, mid-term jury, pre-final jury, reports, seminar, etc. and for theory subjects as tutorials, class tests, in-sem and end-sem examinations.

PO Attainment

- The COs which contribute to the POs and PSOs are identified, plotted with mapping factors and computed to POs & PSOs through quantitative measurement.
- Attainment of each CO is measured from mapping factors of two components; firstly, each CO is assigned with mapping factor derived from contact hours in 3-point scale (3-..2- 1-.), and secondly, the mean percentage score obtained by each student in sum of CIA and CEE, is allocated with mapping factors (Correlation Level) of three rating scale; 3 (Strong more than 75%), 2 (Medium-50.1 to 74.9%) and 1 (Weak less than 50%).
- The rated values of attainment of COs are aligned with corresponding POs and PSOs and average value is computed for the class to assess the attainment of each POs and PSOs.

 named, "Shodh-Sankalp' to facilitate and encourage technical writing skills.
- IIC, INFLIBNET(UGC): Consent to publish your profile in the Vidwan Database-reg, Subscribing Journal, E-portal, Nptel. Faculty members Contribute as a Resource Person, for FDPs, TTPs Organised by COA-TRC
- During the online mode in pandemic period, Innovative Teaching Methodology experiments were carried out by teachers and demonstrated to students through various ways of exploring digital platforms.
- · Guidance sessions are organized for final year Thesis students by expert faculty members
- ICT enabled modern infrastructure includes class rooms and assembly hall with LCD, wi-fi connections in all teaching areas, computers and essential software and equipment, help to adopt the pedagogy in accord with the objectives of the institute.

3.4.1.QIM: Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development, and impact thereof during the last five years.

- The institute organizes a range of extension activities to reach to academic community in the campus, neighboring community and extends its extension activities to the wider community beyond neighbors.
- The vision of SCOA is to make sensible and responsible architects of the society. A creative session with noble cause with T-shirt painting on theme of social and environment awareness is conducted as first assignment, in first year to sensitize young students to social issues followed by a procession wearing painted shirts in the campus spreading the messages and culminating with an oath ceremony of taking pledge to serve the country.
- The extension activities Include Tree Plantation Drive in the campus and in neighboring reserved forest
- Various extension activities such as Blood donation camps, voter awareness, visits to old-age homes and orphanages, mask-making activity during COVID-19, beautification of city, creative visuals at primary schools for less privileged children, heritage conservation initiatives are conducted by the institute helping the students to be sensitive about their surroundings.
- SCOA faculty and students together participated in the documentation and rejuvenation of step-wells in collaboration with the Maharashtra stepwell campaign. Study tours are conducted for documenting rural settlements in various remote locations with creative and practical proposals for their requirements. Direct involvement of students for upliftment of community and environment was found in the beach cleaning near the settlements which was published in the local newspaper and in activities of exchanging craft and model making knowledge with school children.
- To participate in social service of helping needy villagers around the city, the institute has entered into a MoU with a NGO Named 'Samindra Foundation'. Staff and students donated various items including food grains for them and school stationery items to the village kids. The same foundation was also donated with household items, food, and clothes for Chiplun flood victims during difficult period of pandemic.

 STES extended its help for social causes during COVID-19 by offering its boys hostels in the campus as quarantine center times.

3.4.2. QnM:Awards and recognitions received for extension activities from government / government recognized bodies

- SCOA faculty and student volunteers received certificates and appreciation for organizing the blood donation camp in the college multipurpose hall and including all to participate for social causes.
- The institute also received appreciation from the NGO for arranging the collection drive in college premises and handing over the collected goods for rural communities.
- SCOA faculty members and students received appreciation and recognition for contributing individually for victims of natural calamities and for donations made to underprivileged students for education.
- The Beach Cleaning Drive by first-year students during the study tour was acknowledged by the media and the Gram Panchayat of Dive Agar, a small town in Kokan Region.
- The institute holds several credentials for participating in competitions and proposals at the urban level.

Criterion 4 - Infrastructure and Learning Resources

4.1.1 QIM: Availability of adequate infrastructure and physical facilities viz., classrooms, laboratories, ICT infrastructure, facilities for cultural and sports activities, gymnasium, yoga centre etc. in the institution

- Adequate infrastructure facilities available as per apex governing body Council of Architecture for B. Arch and M.Arch. Infrastructure divided into two categories first for formal teaching learning happens includes classrooms, studios, assembly halls, multipurpose hall. Second category supportive spaces for enhancement and strengthening of teaching-learning as department library, material museum, construction yard, various laboratories as model-making lab, surveying lab, environmental lab, computer labs etc.
- Studios are equipped with workstations, electric sockets and wi-fi for laptop and internet connections, large tables for student-teacher discussions and large pin-up boards for conducting design juries periodically. The classrooms are equipped for carrying out theory lectures with LCD and screens.
- There is a permanent exhibition gallery along passages where best academic works of students are displayed and updated every year for parents, aspirant candidates, visitors, and others to glimpse. There is a NASA room, separate common rooms for girls and boys. SCOA has two libraries, a department library, and an exclusive institute section in 24X7 central library.
- Campus houses many institutes, hostels for girls and boys, staff quarters etc. and is equipped with adequate facilities for cultural and sports activities and large events.
- Sports facilities include area for indoor games and gymnasium, outdoor sports such as cricket ground, badminton and tennis court, athletic track, swimming pool, etc.
- The amphitheater can accommodate a few thousands, where an annual inter-college cultural festival is organized
- Large parking ground is used for dandiya and annual carnivals with various events, food stalls and games.

4.2.1 QIM: Library automation using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), subscription to e-resources including provision of links to OER repositories, amount spent on purchase of books, journals and usage of library.

- SCOA has department library which is open on all institute working days
- 24X7 Central Library of Six floors with SCOA Section in second floor in the campus which accommodates books, journals, reports etc
- In last five years from 2018-19 to 2022-23, Rs. 75 lakh appx., was spent on purchasing books, Rs. 3.9 lakh appx. was spent for renewing subscription of journals (more than 18 Indian and 4 International)
- Online access to e-content for architecture in SCOA library portal is available to students through their login to refer lecture notes, reference material etc. and students were immensely benefitted during Covid 19 pandemic period.
- All students and faculty members are provided with one additional Central library card by which they can borrow books from eight more libraries of Sinhgad Institutes in the campus.
- The digital section in the Central library provides shared access to e-resources with other institute of STES like K-Hub in Architecture with SKNCOA, DELNET with SCOE, IEEE, Springer, NLIST.
- For library Automation, SCOA had Autolib (version 1.0), an integrated library management software (ILMS) from 2005 to November 2022, and from December 2022, KOHA (version 21.11.12.000), an ILMS has been installed.
- There is an Anti-Plagiarism software Check for Plag. purchased for scanning students' research dissertations before submission to detect the authentication of their works and to prevent copying
- The Central library has User tracker facility to monitor footfalls. Reading halls in central library are Wi-Fi enabled. All library activities of SCOA are supervised by the library committee under the guidance of competent librarian

4.3.1. QIM: Institution frequently updates its IT facilities and provides sufficient bandwidth for internet connection

- SCOA is committed to provide state-of-the-art IT infrastructure and services for students, faculty and for administrative staff. The building is wi-fi enabled through a dedicated server for SCOA connected to a common internet service for all institutes in the campus.
- High speed internet with bandwidth of 250MBPS is available at campus and 16MBPS in the institute.
- Faculty and students can access wi-fi facility 24 x 7 and 365 days.
- Internet facility is provided with LAN services to studios, classrooms, assembly hall, faculty rooms and administration areas.
- STES has an Internet registered domain name http://sinhgad.edu, using which unique email id and e-mail services is provided to faculty, staff, and students.
- SCOA has two computer labs one for B. Arch and one lab for M. Arch. A total number of computers available in working condition is 128 for B. Arch and 26 for M. Arch., and wired connection of LAN service is provided to all computers in the lab to conduct classes.
- Faculty members are provided with individual Desktop with internet facility. All computers are regularly formatted, updated with latest operating system, installed with latest software as per the syllabus requirement, such as AutoCAD and sketch-up.
- During COVID-19 pandemic period, Microsoft Teams software was purchased by STES for conducting online classes.
- STES has developed its mobile application 'Sinhgad Student App' for smooth conduction of admission process and transaction of fees by students.
- Printers, scanners, photocopy facility are provided in the institute. To keep records of attendance of employees, Biometric attendance system has been installed.

DECENTRALIZATION:

STES LEVEL:Governing Body (GB) is the highest committee led by the president, secretary, vice-presidents, top level management representatives of STES and the principal; provides leadership, guidance, help for implementation and to monitor in compliance with statutory bodies, frames policies and time to time amendment, mobilize resources, takes decisions for intake, admission, recruitment, promotion, salary, finance, infrastructure, and lead SCOA in accordance with institute's vision and mission.

- Principal as head of the institute and link between management and institute, implements management
 policies, complying with norms of statutory bodies and fulfils all requirements through various
 college committees with uniform distribution of responsibilities amongst faculty and staff for all
 institutional activities.
- The College Development Committee (CDC) formed with management leaders and with principal, selected senior faculty and non-teaching staff, who are the next tier leaders for institute governance.

SCOA LEVEL: Three-tier system for undergraduate course and a two-tier system for postgraduate course functioning for curriculum delivery is adopted.

- Internal Academic Monitoring Committee (IAMC) is the most active body constituted with HODs and Division Heads headed by the principal.
- Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) with the leadership of the IQAC coordinator, all seven criterion coordinators and mentors formulate and monitor the quality benchmarks and development strategy for conscious and consistent improvement.
- A bottom-up approach is implemented with formation of a student-teacher body 'Susamwad' for carrying out various co and extra-curricular activities.

6.2.1. QIM: The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment and service rules, procedures, deployment of institutional Strategic/ perspective/development plan etc.

- Four sub-committees under Governing Body are constituted with top management representatives and principal, senior faculty and staff of the institute:

- Examination committee: headed by the Chief Examination Officer (CEO) with other faculty and staff, library committee is led by librarian with other members, Admission committee is constituted with non-teaching staff headed by a faculty.
- Administrative departments as accounts section, examination section, HR, students' section, scholarship section etc. with non-teaching staff, headed by assistant Registrar. The website committee is formed with teaching and non-teaching staff for uploading events and important notices.
- Research cell is headed by ARC, a senior faculty who follows up SPPU sponsored research, and, seminar and conference committee organize state / national level.
- Other Statutory Committees- Anti-ragging committee, Anti-ragging Squad and Mentoring cell, Women's cell, Grievance cell, Reservation cell.
- Students' activities are jointly organized by faculty and students at three levels; students council at SPPU level, headed by the Student Development Officer (SDO), a senior faculty assigned for the post, students council at campus level is formed with faculty and student representatives for organizing inter-college cultural and sports events, and an institute level student-teacher committee 'susamwad' is formed for carrying out all co and extra-curricular activities.

- SCOA is a self-financed institution.College receives grants from other agencies like SPPU for seminar, conference, examination, research, sports equipment etc.

The finance committee prepares and monitors annual budget which is approved by the management for all recurring and non-recurring expenses.

- Existing building maintenance, purchase of equipment, computers and for upgradation of digital facilities which was necessary during pandemic period for online teaching learning.
- Sponsoring faculty to update knowledge by attending conferences/ workshops and FDPs, adding books in library and renewal of magazines and journals, staff, and students' welfare, etc. Extra-curricular activities like cultural and various other events, sports, other events related to all-round development of students. RESOURCE MOBILIZATION:
- Focuses on sustainability of the institution, effective and efficient use of resources: human, finance, physical, existing infra-structure and support facilities, policies, and efficient budget allocation and to develop an alternate model for generating external funds.
- The college infrastructure is utilized as an examination center for government examinations. Library reading rooms are open 24x7 for benefit of students.
